More about what we offer

The Sexualized Violence Response team at the Hope and Area Transition Society is comprised of our Community Outreach worker, Community Navigator, Committee Coordinator, and team lead. The SV response team provides service to Hope, Sunshine Valley, Manning Park, Agassiz/Kent/ Harrison Hot Spring and Boston Bar. Our team provides trauma informed, client centered support valuing your voice and your choice.

The SV response team offers; ongoing emotional support, accompaniment to hospital, physician, RCMP, Victim Services, and other service providers. Group and one to one support, customized wellness plans based on survivors' individual needs, community-based referrals (mental health, health clinic, food bank, etc.), customized prevention presentations, information sessions.

About Sexual Violence

Sexual Violence is an all-encompassing, non-legal term that refers to behaviors and actions that are unwanted and sexual in nature and is without your consent. This can include unwanted touching, sexual harassment, indecent exposure, stalking, cyberviolence/ cyber-misogyny, sharing certain photos and gender-based sexual violence.



Disclosure: When you share your experience with a friend, family member, support worker, counsellor, elder, doctor.

Reporting: Making an official report to the authorities like RCMP.

The steps you take after sexualized violence is your choice. Disclosure or reporting is your choice. Third party reporting is an anonymous report to RCMP and may be available to you.

Most respondents to a recent Canadian survey who experienced harassment, sexual harassment or violence in the past two years indicated that they experienced these behaviors more than once.

Half of the survey respondents said that they experienced the harassing or violent behavior from an individual with authority over them, while 44% experienced the behavior from a co-worker.
